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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Arts, Science and Commerce College, Ozar (Mig), Taluka- Niphad, District - Nashik, run by the Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj, is established in June1984. This is the most well-known college in Niphad Taluka. This college is re-accredited at 'B++' level with CGPA 2.77 in 2019 by the NAAC. The college has ISO 9001:2015 certification. The college is affiliated to the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune-7 (ID No PU/Ns/ASC/027/1984) and located in the area of Shejalwadi, Tilaknagar, Ozar (Mig). Mostly the rural students are benefitted for their graduate and post-graduate degrees. With its rich heritage of academic excellence, the enrolled students are mainly from middle, lower middle class and agricultural background. Out of total enrolled students, college has almost 60% girl students. The college is imparting quality education in 13 undergraduate courses and 04 post-graduate courses in Arts, Science and Commerce faculties including Bachelor of Vocational (B. Voc.), a professional degree. The different departments of the Science and B. Voc. have well established laboratories with sophisticated instruments.

The college has well-qualified and highly motivated teaching staff constantly upgrading their knowledge accordingly to modern era of education. Furthermore, the supporting staff of the college is very co-operative and sincere. The faculty of the college believe that learning beyond classroom is equally important as the classroom interaction. Hence, students are encouraged to achieve academic excellence by imparting quality teaching-learning activities in class rooms as well as in laboratories. The teachers also motivate students to participate in several co-curricular, extra-curricular and research activities. On the background of implementation of the New Education Policy in higher education, the college adopted choice-based credit system (CBCS) for undergraduate as well as post-graduate students. With choice-based credit system we are prepared to offer multi-disciplinary courses to the students.

We've mastered a blended approach to education by integrating technologies like Google Classroom and YouTube into our lessons. Academic research is an integral part of the higher education system, so to keep the research at the priority; the students are motivated to engage themselves in the research by giving research projects. Through research, students develop critical thinking expertise as well as effective analytical, research and communication skills that are globally required and extremely beneficial. The continuous guidance and cooperation of our parent institution, Parents, Alumni, and Stakeholders, enable us to play a significant role in imparting quality education, which aspires students and helps them to explore their talent, strength and skill and able to set future pathways to success for themselves.

- The institution offers a Bachelor of Vocation (B.Voc) in Electrical Technology as part of its vocational education component.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune, and follows the CBCS curriculum from

2019 prescribed by the university. The admissions, curriculum and evaluation processes are followed as per the norms prescribed by the affiliating university, Government of Maharashtra and the University Grants Commission (UGC). Online and merit-based admission process is followed by the college. The college ensures smooth and effective curriculum delivery through well-planned and documented process which includes preparation of academic calendar, time-table, departmental meetings, departmental Callender, departmental timetable, teachers' diary and use of ICT. During Covid-19 pandemic various online platforms were used for curriculum delivery. Two faculty members have representation as a BOS member. Teachers have taken active participation in academic bodies of the university and activities related to curriculum development and assessment of the affiliating University.

All the **13** undergraduates and **04** post graduate programmes are offered through the Choice Based Credit System/Elective course system. The college offered **30** Certificate courses focusing on the employability and skill development of the students in the last five years. During last five years, the college has introduced **01** undergraduate (B.Voc. in Electrical Technology), **03** postgraduate (M Com, MSc Analytical Chemistry and MSc Physics) programmes.

The curriculum offers courses related to cross-cutting issues like Professional Ethics, Gender Equality, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability in UG/PG programs. The college has organized various activities on gender, human values, etc. As many as **458** students benefited from experiential learning through field visits/project work/internships in the assessment period. Online as well as offline feedbacks on curriculum, about the college, and teachers are collected from various stakeholders. It is then analysed and discussed in the departmental meetings and necessary action is taken by communicating IQAC for further necessary improvement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University and the Students are admitted as per rules and regulations laid down by the University, Govt. of Maharashtra and UGC. The Reservation policy of admissions of various categories is strictly followed. During last five years 2742 students have taken admission. 84.06% is the enrolment percentage from 2019-20 to 2023-24. **83.57%** students are admitted belonging to the reserve category.

The faculty of the college are highly qualified and specialized in the respective subject areas. In 2023-24 there are total 19 faculties with PhD degree and 6 research guides and 21 teachers are NET/SET qualified. The total percentage of full time teaches with NET/SET/PhD during last five years is **76.61%**. The percentage of full-time teachers against sanction post during the last five years is **83.5%**. The student to teacher ratio is **22:1**.

The College practices various student-centric activities with a view to inculcate knowledge, values and give hands on experience, participative learning and research skills to students. The participation in Avishkar Research Poster Presentation, On the Job Training, Field visits and Projects are integral part of experiential, Collaborative, participative and problem-solving learning. The aim of the college is holistic development of the student which is fulfilled through organising various curricular and co-curricular and extracurricular activities which helps to address the academic as well as socio-psychological needs of students. Use of ICT tools including interactive panel in Seminar Hall, MOOC courses on SWAYAM Portal and Career Katta courses are offered. E-books, e-newspapers, e-magazines, videos, audio podcasts, social media posts, are used. B.Voc. Department organises BOSCH Artisan Training. At the beginning of semester, the subject teacher explains the PSOs, COs and POs and take into account these PSOs, COs and POs while doing paper setting and at the time

of assessment. The college communicates the POs and COs of all 17 academic programmes to students through various means such as: college prospectus, website, notice boards, Principal's address, induction programmes and mentoring sessions. For attainment the results are evaluated by looking at student performance, such as the pass percentage, the proportion of students who graduate and the number of students who drop out and the attainment levels are realised. The pass percentage of last five years is **74.5%**. The college practices continuous internal evaluation (CIE) system. Online teaching and online exam are practiced during Covid-19 pandemic.

The grievances during university theory examinations are forwarded to the university by the Grievance Committee. The Committee organises regular meetings for the timely redressal of different types of Grievances such as College level and University level. Total 51 Student Grivances are received and redressed by the Committee during last five years.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institute actively fosters a vibrant research culture among students and faculty. By offering workshops and seminars, it encourages innovative thinking and collaborative projects. The college has **received grants of Rs.388509.82** for research projects.

The college boasts a well-established innovation ecosystem that nurtures creativity and entrepreneurship. it includes IIC, PRADNYA Cell (founded by parent Institute), Funding policy for research activity, startup club, Avishkar Participation, Academic research cell and Regular workshops and mentorship programs foster a culture of experimentation and problem-solving. This dynamic environment empowers individuals to turn ideas into impactful solutions.

The college has **organized 24 seminars** and workshops focused on IPR, entrepreneurship, and research methodology. These events provide valuable insights and practical skills to students and faculty. The college has made impressive contributions to academia, with **135 research papers** published by faculty and students. Additionally, **34 book chapters** showcase in-depth insights across various disciplines. The innovation extends to the creation of **6 patents**, highlighting the college's commitment to original research.

The college has actively undertaken around **54 extension activities through NCC and NSS**, engaging students in meaningful community service. Initiatives like Swachhata Abhiyan promote cleanliness and environmental awareness. Road Safety Campaigns and Blood Donation Camps raise awareness about crucial health and safety issues. Programs such as AIDS Awareness and Eye Organ Donation initiatives educate the community on vital health topics. The college also supports COVID-19 vaccination efforts, emphasizing public health. Additionally, events like Yoga Day, Tree Plantation drives, and Voter Awareness campaigns foster a sense of responsibility and well-being among students and the community. College is appreciated for these activities and received **17** awards from various agencies.

The college has established **25 MOUs** with various institutes, enhancing academic collaboration and resource sharing.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Our institution has a vibrant campus spread across **3.83** acres, featuring modern infrastructure that supports academic excellence, personal growth, and environmental sustainability. With a strong focus on providing a

conducive learning environment, we have invested in maintaining and upgrading our physical and academic facilities.

Our three-storied building houses **28** well-ventilated classrooms, **12** laboratories, and ICT facilities, providing an ideal learning environment for our **1146** students. Additional facilities include a central library, robust and eco-friendly power supply system, comprehensive sports facilities, seminar/auditorium hall, canteen, staff room, NSS office and NCC office. Our campus prioritizes accessibility, sustainability, and technology integration.

The college library has evolved into a modern, fully automated knowledge hub. Spanning 1,852 square feet, it houses a diverse collection of **27,784** books, e-resources, audio books for blind students and digital databases. Key features include automated library management, online public access catalogue, broadband connection, and subscription to INFLIBNET and N-List consortia.

The college offers various facilities on the campus that caters to the physical development of the students; spacious ground, jogging track, basketball court, ground for volley ball, cricket, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho and indoor facilities like weight lifting, power lifting, table tennis, 10 m shooting range, etc.

Our institution boasts a robust IT infrastructure, supporting academic excellence and administrative efficiency. Key features include high-speed internet connectivity, Wi-Fi coverage, **122** desktops, 5 laptops, and 5 computer labs. We utilize various software and digital tools, including e-campus software, Google Meet, IT Soft HRMS, Auto Lib Software, and Tally Prime Software.

In the academic year 2023-24, our institution maintains a student-computer ratio of **11:1**, providing 111 computers for the use of 1146 students, ensuring accessible and efficient technology-enhanced learning.

To ensure optimal functioning, our institute has established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic, and support facilities. Respective departments conduct daily and periodic maintenance, with designated personnel responsible for upkeep and record-keeping. Regular monitoring, stock verification, and preventive maintenance ensure optimal functionality and resource utilization.

The institute has demonstrated its commitment to infrastructure maintenance, spending amount on upkeep and repair of physical and academic facilities. This investment ensures a conducive learning environment, supporting academic and extracurricular activities.

Student Support and Progression

The college provides scholarships and other forms of financial support from the state and central governments. In the last five years, 3183 students (**51.7%**) have earned scholarships worth **Rs.1,21,82,369/-**. It includes Government Scholarship worth Rs.1,15,83,194/-and non-government scholarship worth Rs.5,99,175/-. Our student Spandan Babar received INSPIRE Scholarship worth Rs.4,00,000/-.

Scholarships and free ships are distributed on time. The college has also aided economically weaker students through the 'Earn and Learn' program, waiving their fees. The college offers financial assistance to needy students through the Student Aid Fund Scheme.

In the previous five years, a variety of activities and programs aimed at improving students' soft skills, language and communication skills, life skills, and technological awareness have been conducted.

Through various activities like Carrier counselling, Competitive Examination guidance, and activities by Placement Cell assisted **22.14%** of students. Two students qualify SET examination and **122** students qualify other examinations.

The institution has a transparent framework for promptly resolving student issues through various committees such as the Internal Complaints Committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, and Anti-Ragging Committee.

In the last five years 256 students have been employed in state government services and commercial companies, and 311 have progressed to further study.

In the last five years, students participated in **78** sport and **06** cultural events organised by the college and other institutes. Our students have won **23 medals** in sports and **15 awards** in cultural event. Our student Shubham Bhandare's achievement was mentioned by **Hon. Prime minister Narendra Modi** in his 'Man Ki Bat' program. He won **8 Gold medals in National and International sport** competition and received Best player award of our parent institute 'MVP Samaj Nashik'.

There is a registered Alumni Association since 2018. Alumni association made financial contribution worth **Rs.1,55,405/-.** Various facilities like TV Screen, Benches etc. were purchased from this fund. Alumni are actively involved in different college events, serving as guide and facilitators for curricular and extracurricular activities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has established a robust governance and leadership structure aligned with its vision and mission statement, ensuring a cohesive approach to achieving institutional goals. The parent institute nominates members to the College Development Committee (CDC), fostering close collaboration among the CDC, management, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), Principal, and staff. This partnership strives for excellence in teaching, learning, and administrative operations. The IQAC takes the lead in preparing the *Perspective Plan*, which guides the planning and execution of activities to ensure continuous institutional improvement.

The college promotes a culture of decentralization and participative management, encouraging shared decisionmaking through a range of academic and administrative committees. To enhance administrative efficiency, the college has introduced e-governance systems, effectively streamlining operations in finance, accounts, scholarships, student admissions, and examinations.

For employee welfare, the parent institute has implemented a Human Resource Management System (HRMS), supporting staff through a variety of benefits and services. Employees have access to loan facilities, incentives, and welfare schemes provided by Nashik District Maratha Vidhya Prasarak Samaj Sevak Co-Operative Society Ltd. and Nashik District College Teachers Co-Operative Society Ltd. Faculty members are actively encouraged to pursue research and professional development through Faculty Development Programs (FDPs), conferences, workshops, and refresher courses. Over **108** teaching and non-teaching staff members have participated in professional development programs, with **21** teachers receiving financial support of **?.20785**.

The college employs a Performance-Based Appraisal System (PBAS) for both teaching and non-teaching staff to ensure accountability and continual improvement. Financial management and resource mobilization are closely monitored, with internal audits conducted annually by the parent institute and external audits by certified accountants (CA) and the Government of Maharashtra.

The IQAC plays a pivotal role in ensuring quality assurance, significantly contributing to the implementation of the *Perspective Plan*. It maintains a well-structured feedback system, collecting, analysing, and acting on feedback as per management guidelines. Progress reports from all academic and administrative committees are regularly gathered and evaluated by IQAC. Additionally, the IQAC conducts regular Academic and Administrative Audits (AAA) to ensure continuous quality improvement across all functions of the college.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

A gender audit is conducted considering the average male–female ratio during the last five years. The college has adopted several measures to bring gender equity. Women empowerment cell plays proactive role by taking several initiatives of gender sensitization. Student Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Committee, Discipline Committee strives for the promotion of gender equity among girls and boys through activities like anniversaries of prominent women icons, laws concerning women, yoga for health, organization of special lectures on legal rights, health awareness activities. The college has placed CCTV cameras to ensure safety in the campus.

College promotes harmony and tolerance towards diversity by designing policies and by conducting activities and programs. The college celebrates commemorative days of personalities to acquaint students with their life and work. To sensitize students and teachers towards constitutional obligations, National integration activities like pledge taking on Constitution Day, National Integration Day, World AIDS Day, Preamble Reading, Voter Awareness, Poster Presentation, and Elocution programs are organized.

As per the policy of the college, vibrant campus environment has been created that allows equal participation of girls and boys in all the activities. Green audits and energy audits are conducted to measure the impact of green initiatives.

The college has built rainwater harvesting system having two reservoirs to fulfil non-drinking purpose water requirements on the campus. A vermicomposting plant processes the organic solid waste and creates manure for the plants.

The college has established two Solar Photovoltaic power systems with a capacity of 15.36 KW and 3 KW. Energy efficient devices are used to ensure energy conservation. Green campus initiatives include rain water harvesting, plantation, display of awareness slogans, plastic-free campus etc.

The college has disabled friendly environment and facilities that include railings and ramps, help centre, wheel chairs, audio books for blind students and provision of writers to disabled students for examination.

The college has two best practices 'Green Campus' and 'Solar Energy Ambassador.' The college has taken enormous efforts environmental activities and identifies 'Environment friendly approach' as institutional distinctiveness.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Our college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. The adoption of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) pattern by the University commenced in the academic year 2019-20. In accordance with the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) framework, the institution provides a range of interdisciplinary non-CGPA courses that emphasise self-learning and value-based education. The subjects of study include Physical Education, Democracy, Election, and Good Governance. The concept of value added refers to the increase in worth or utility that is achieved through a certain process or activity. The courses referred to are additional credit- bearing courses available to first-year students across several academic disciplines. Environmental Studies is a compulsory subject for second-year students across all disciplines, while Generic Electives are optional courses that can be taken for additional credit by final-year students. As per University guidelines our college adopted NEP-2020 for PG classes and for UG classes institution will adopt the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 starting in the Academic Year 2024-2025, hence introducing a range of interdisciplinary courses. In accordance with the regulations and guidelines set forth by the university, we will adhere to the prescribed protocols.
	College celebrated NEP-Week as per the guidelines of UGC and also conduct School-Connect awareness programme financially supported by SPPU, Pune.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	According to the National Education Policy 2020, the college intends to adopt the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) in order to enhance the academic mobility of students. Our institution also implements policy guidelines for the appropriate transfer of credits. The college has implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in accordance with the principles set forth by the university. The Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU) has informed the college regarding the requisite measures to be taken for the implementation of ABC. A session was organised by the college faculties to ease the opening of DigiLocker accounts and provide detailed instructions for the generation of ABC Id. The institution has designated a faculty member as a Nodal officer to oversee the implementation of the instructions provided by the Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU).

3. Skill development:

In response to evolving workforce demands, academic institutions are compelled to provide students with the necessary training and skills that align with the contemporary requirements of job markets. The development of skills is an integral aspect of education in the 21st century. In order to adequately prepare students for the job market and provide them with the necessary competences to navigate real-world issues, it is imperative that they possess the requisite knowledge, skills, and abilities in both professional and personal domains. The College consistently endeavours to establish a comprehensive educational environment by organising workshops, lectures, interactive sessions, as well as offering additional courses and certificate programmes. Certain students who have completed accounting and taxation programmes successfully fulfil the requirements set by their employers and secure employment within the financial sector, encompassing banks, credit unions, start-ups, and prominent enterprises. Students that actively participate in organic farming assume the role of mentors for local farmers and provide support to their immediate social circles, including friends and family. Value-added classes are implemented at the department level, aiming to enhance students' understanding of professional ethics, human values, and social etiquette. The university has approved for two value-added courses from the academic year 2020-2021, for all disciplines namely "Student Solar Ambassador" and "Medicinal Plant Nursery, Floriculture, Gardening, Nursery Techniques, and Vegetative Propagation." The college cultural committee offers training programmes to students with the aim of nurturing their talents, which can be further developed and applied in professional contexts. These programmes encompass several artistic disciplines, including dance, music, theatre, writing, and public speaking. A significant proportion of students have undertaken internships and successfully secured positions across several sectors. The college is now implementing the skill enhancement courses as per the curriculum prescribed by the affiliated University. In addition to its academic offerings, the college also offers vocational programmes, including a Bachelor of Vocation (B. Voc) in Electrical Technology. The college also fosters the cultivation of soft skills

	among students through the organisation of talks delivered by distinguished individuals from many domains. Besides CBCS, the college provides Computer Training Courses for the students.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The college has made the study of Indian languages and culture, as well as the Indian knowledge system, a central part of its curriculum. The College annually celebrates Marathi Day (February 27), Hindi Day (September 14), and English Day (April 23) to pay tribute to the languages and cultures. We have annual collegiate Marathi elocution competitions. The current happenings of the year are the topic of our annual gathering. Annual poetry competitions often feature a social justice theme. The college has made a number of changes to its curriculum to better reflect the Indian knowledge system. We adopt a bilingual approach to education here at our college. We use the same medium to teach all three languages (Hindi, English, and Marathi). The curriculum includes instruction in the lingua franca and the literary canon of the era. The business communication and science courses are offered in English, whereas the social science courses are given in Marathi. Clarity of expression is the primary motivation for adopting a multilingual strategy. To keep in touch with our Indian Knowledge System, Dept of History organised 15 days workshop on Modi Lipi. Students are encouraged to keep in touch with their Indian heritage through contests involving essay writing, poetry, public speaking, folk song, folk dance, and skit. Through cultural programme like "Yuva Spandan" students presents rich cultural heritage of the country.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The primary objective of this college is to prioritise outcome-based education. This educational college provides effective instruction to its students by aligning its curriculum with the programme outcomes (POs), programme specific outcomes (PSOs), and course outcomes (COs) specified in the syllabus for each programme as mandated by the affiliating university. Since the academic year 2019-20, Pune University has successfully implemented the CBCS- Revised. The institution has successfully adjusted its approach to curriculum design and instructional practises to align with the principles of Outcome- Based Education (OBE). Annually, the college organises an event when alumni and parents convene

to engage in discourse pertaining to outcome-based education. The implementation of outcome-based instruction is a necessary component in science laboratories, computer laboratories, and language laboratories. Field excursions and project activities facilitate the development of a broad perspective among students. The syllabi provided a diverse array of subject matter, incorporating various educational methods such as internships, field visits, research projects, presentations/seminars, quizzes, and demonstrations. Every programme offered by the College is designed to effectively achieve the Course Outcomes (COs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Programme Outcomes (POs) through a well-balanced blend of content and activities. Experiential modules, such as field visits, internships, and laboratory sessions, facilitate the development of frameworks that establish connections between theoretical knowledge and practical application for students. These practises are designed to facilitate the achievement of desired learning objectives, while actively involving students in the learning process through various instructional methods. The pedagogical approaches and assessment methods that prioritise the learner's needs and goals are developed with careful consideration of the desired learning outcomes, which are effectively conveyed to all relevant parties involved. The institution has implemented strategies to evaluate the degree to which the programme outcomes (graduate attributes), program-specific outcomes, and course outcomes (POs, PSOs, and COs) have been attained. Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is an educational framework that involves the reorganisation of curriculum, pedagogy, and assessment methods to prioritise the attainment of advanced levels of learning, rather than a simple collection of academic credits. The conventional education system prioritises the content being taught, but Outcome-Based Education (OBE) places greater emphasis on the acquisition of knowledge and skills by the students, hence adopting a learner-centered approach. The student induction programme encompasses an introduction to the theoretical framework of outcome-based education, together with a comprehensive elucidation of the curriculum outcomes tailored specifically for the students. The curriculum of the institute explicitly articulates the Programme Outcomes (PO),

	Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO), and Course Outcomes (CO). Moreover, the teaching-learning pedagogy employed at the institute effectively incorporates Outcome-Based Education (OBE), with the aim of fostering the development of responsible citizenship among the students. The input provided by students is utilised to build an action plan with the aim of enhancing academic performance in subsequent periods.
6. Distance education/online education:	Since the year 2019, educational institutions within the country have implemented digital platforms as a means of facilitating interactive lessons, organising conferences, and conducting meetings, among other activities. Despite the potential drawbacks associated with the absence of in-person instruction, online education has effectively transcended geographical limitations by facilitating the exchange of knowledge and fostering collaboration between professionals and students situated in disparate regions. The post- pandemic reopening of educational institutions has facilitated the adoption of a hybrid method of education known as 'PHYGITAL', which integrates both online and offline resources. The concept of the "new normal" is also reflected in the New Education Policy. As a result of the knowledge acquired during the period of Covid-19 closure, limitations pertaining to the availability of online resources for both educators and students will no longer pose a hindrance. In addition to the aforementioned amenities, our institution boasts a study centre affiliated with YCMOU. The college has made worthy additions to its physical and ICT resources like Interactive Panel. The college possesses ample familiarity with virtual and blended learning methods and is confident in its ability to meet the requirements outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP).

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The curriculum is designed by the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune which is strictly followed by the college. The syllabus of each subject is prepared by the respective Board of Studies (BOS) constituted by the university, which in turn form several sub-committees consisting of teachers invited from colleges to prepare the structure and content of the syllabus. **Two faculty** members worked as a **BOS** member and **12 teachers** participated in the **framing of the curriculum** as members of the Committee of courses or the sub-committees constituted by BOS.

Planning of Curriculum Delivery

- IQAC consults with Principal and Staff and prepares **Academic Calendar** in consonance with the University Academic Calendar in the first week of every academic year for curriculum planning and implementation. **Academic Calendar is uploaded on the college website** and also displayed on the student notice board. The academic calendar lays down a very strong foundation of academic delivery.
- **Master timetable** is prepared for each program. All the departments follow to the master time table and prepare departmental time tables.
- A department-wise theory and practical timetable is prepared to ensure the smooth conduct of lectures and practical sessions.

Curriculum Delivery Procedure:

- The induction programme acquaints the students with POs, PSOs and COs and exam patterns.
- A well-structured **Mentoring System** is practiced to enhance the engagement levels of students holistically
- In **Departmental meeting the** head of the department directs distribution of work among the teachers and teacher prepares **teaching plan** following academic calendar.
- Every teacher maintains **Digital Teaching Diary** wherein daily records of lectures, practical or other activities are documented.
- **During the COVID-19 pandemic**, IQAC prepared a timetable for online teaching. Accordingly, the departments conducted online classes through platforms like **Google Meet, Zoom, etc.**
- Use of Student-centric methods like **Flipped-classrooms**, seminars and workshops, debates, on-the-job training, projects, industrial visits and internships.
- Conventional method of teaching is **integrated with ICT based methods.**
- **Guest lectures** of eminent faculty members from other institutions are arranged to give exposure of the current trends and the latest subject knowledge.

- The departments **organize study tours, field project and industrial visits** for students' exposure to practical knowledge.
- The faculty members promote the use of reference books and e-resources accessible at the institute's **Network Resource Centre** and **INFLIBNET** to improve and expand the students' understanding of their subjects.
- At the end of every semester, teachers submit **Syllabus Completion Report** to the IQAC to monitor successful implementation of teaching plans

Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

- The college adheres to the norms and guidelines of affiliated university for **continuous internal** evaluation.
- College Examination Officer (CEO) along with the chairman of timetable committee prepares the schedule of internal evaluation.
- The respective teacher of each concerned subject has his/her pattern of internal examination like oral, quizzes, assignments, problem solving, practical, group discussions, presentations, projects, class test, etc. As per their teaching plans, each teacher takes the liberty to schedule their internal examination.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

The curriculum is designed by Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU), Pune. While framing the curriculum the recent issues faced by the society and many crosscutting issues related to ethics, gender, human values, environmental sustainability and awareness are integrated in course offered to UG and PG programmes. The curriculum includes compulsory credits on Environment awareness, Constitution, Democracy, Cyber Laws, Human Rights, Human values for UG and PG students. Gender equality and women empowerment is included in curriculum of Psychology and Political Science. The course related to environmental awareness cover areas like sustainability, population, pollution, global warming, environmental policy, disaster management, environment protection, Biodiversity laws, etc. Each teacher integrates all these issues as a part of their teaching-learning process. The main aim of these courses is to enable students to develop a sense of social justice by creating awareness on Human Rights, Diversity, Social Inequality, Caste Discrimination, Women Empowerment, etc. and also to enable students to analyse major Environmental issues and work in the direction of sustainability enabling them to develop affection towards nature.

a) **Professional Ethics**: In Arts, Commerce & Science stream the affiliating university have included the topics in the curriculum on professional ethics to inculcate the professional skills, values, integrity and behaviour amongst the students in work culture

b) Environmental Issues: Environmental Science is a compulsory subject for all second year UG students. Students submit projects at the end of semester to achieve necessary grade. Biodiversity conservation, Phytogeography, environmental ecology, pollution etc. are covered in Botany, and Zoology papers. Some environmental issues are included in the syllabi of Economics and Geography. This sensitizes the students in environmental issues and sustainability and creating awareness about environmental degradation and its remediation through respective disciplines.

c) Human Values: Human Values are covered in the curriculum of Political Science, Economics, History, Geography, Marathi, Hindi, English and B. Com. program. A separate compulsory credit on Human Rights is introduced in curriculum of PG courses to imbibe human values and make students better citizens.

d) **Gender Issues**: The Arts and Commerce stream offers various topics in UG and PG curriculum of History, Hindi, Marathi, English, Political Science, Economics, Psychology on gender, women empowerment, reservation policies, constitutional provisions for women's, etc. to sensitize the students towards gender issues and enable them to work in mentioned area.

Apart from the issues included in the syllabi, our college has taken the various steps to inculcate these issues among the students. National Service Scheme (NSS) cell organizes various environment awareness campaigns and programs. The committee for Woman Antiharassment and internal complaint committee organizes programs on Woman Empowerment, Laws for Woman, Women's Day. Women empowerment related programmes were arranged like *Nirbhay Kanya Abhiyan*. International Women's Day etc.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The College is committed to provide a supportive and transparent assessment and evaluation environment to all students. To address student grievances promptly and effectively, the college has established a robust grievance redressal mechanism which is time- bound and efficient and majority of students are benefitted from it. The Grievance Committee organises regular meetings for the timely redressal of different types of Grievances which are classified into College and University level grievances:

Academic Grievances: Incorrect or missing marks on marksheets, incorrect course name, additions or removals of name, exam pattern issue, difficulties in filling out on line exam forms e.g., Aadhaar card issues, incorrect spellings, change in medium of instruction etc. are timely resolved.

Administrative Grievances: Hall ticket errors e.g., incorrect subject inclusions, course dropout issues, transfer of credits requests between colleges etc. are addressed and corrected in time.

Grievance Redressal Procedure of the college

Student Submission: Students should submit grievances in writing to the Examination Section of the college with relevant details e.g., student name, PRN number, subject codes and supporting documents.

Initial Assessment: The Examination Section review the grievance and gather additional information if necessary. If the grievance is within the college's jurisdiction, the Examination Section immediately resolves it.

Internal Resolution: The Examination Section will attempt to resolve the grievance internally possibly

through discussions with the relevant faculty or department after consulting with the Principal and Savitribai Phule Pune University if required.

Grievance Redressal Procedure of the University:

University Grievance: Students can obtain photocopies of their answer sheets through online application. The College Exam Officer will take necessary follow-ups and the same will be communicated to the students on time. The University Exam Dept review the grievance and take necessary steps through college correspondence.

Feedback to Student: Once the problem is solved, the student will be informed for further action.

Action Taken

The grievances during theory examinations are considered and discussed in consultation with the Principal and forwarded to the university by the Grievance Committee viz. examination form filling, wrong information in hall ticket, fees related issues, wrong entries in marksheet, corrections in mark sheet, revaluation, and pending marksheets etc. are conveyed by HoD to the Chief Examination Officer designated by the college for their redressal. Certain students who were unable to attend the internal examination as scheduled, or who did not get a passing score, are given opportunity to give reexam of the internal test/assignment upon receiving application. The College Examination Officer handles all grievances and communicate to the university using dedicated portal of web mail facility assigned by affiliating university. The college continuously follows the university notifications related to the grievances and informs to the students about solution of their grievances.

To achieve transparency in the internal assessment process following steps are taken:

- A planned internal exam schedule is given in the Academic Calendar
- Question paper pattern and types of tests/assignments are explained in classroom teaching
- The evaluated internal answer scripts are available in the dept
- Mark lists are displayed on the notice board for students

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

The College is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University and it follows curriculum prescribed by the University and offers various conventional degree Programmes at UG and PG level to cater the diversified needs of students who have different previous learning abilities. Teaching, Examination and Evaluations Schemes are prepared with clearly defined Programme Outcomes (POs), Course Outcomes (COs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and the Learning Objectives by faculties of academic departments and made available on college website. At the beginning of semester, the subject teacher explains the PSOs, Cos and POs in the classroom. The teachers also take into account these PSOs, COs and Pos while doing paper setting of various courses and at the time of assessment and evaluation of the students. The POs describe what the students should know and be able to do after completing the programme, such as scientific knowledge, critical thinking, communication skills, problem-solving approach, environmental and social awareness, etc. POs are formulated reflecting the Vision, Mission and Objectives of the College. POs are aligned with the Graduate Attributes and UGC's- LEARNING OUTCOMES-BASED CURRICULUM FRAMEWORK FOR UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION (LOCF). COs specify the skills and competencies that the students should acquire after completing each course following Bloom's taxonomy. COs are designed by the faculties of each academic department and are linked with the PSOs and POs. PSOs state the subject-specific knowledge and skills that the students should attain after completing the programme and develop different skills as expected in each course. Moreover, it inculcates employability and entrepreneurial skills in the students.

The college communicates the POs and COs to students through various means such as: college prospectus, website, notice boards, Principal's Address at various programs, induction programmes and mentoring sessions and other activities organised by the college. The college uses different methods to ensure the attainment of the outcomes, such as student seminar, quiz, group discussions, presentation, assignments and tests, project report etc. This methodology of designing, teaching, examination and evaluation schemes provide the 'Basic Analytics' to teachers to develop customized understanding of the achievement level of an individual student which is helpful in identification of advanced learners and slow learners and to undertake remedial teaching as practiced by Mathematics department. It also enables teachers to make required course correction and to suitably alter/modify academic planning. The college has defined outcomes for all 17 academic programmes which are displayed on the college website. The College has implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) to broaden the teaching and learning activities this also give students the flexibility to opt for courses of their choice.

The college has a well-defined mechanism for internal assessment through departments. The achievement of these outcomes is assessed by each department using internal and university results analysis and the record is maintained. The assessment is done based on the student's performance in internal and external examinations. The external assessment of PO is done by considering various factors such as degree percentage, progression to higher education, achievements, feedbacks of learning experiences. The IQAC obtains Syllabus completion reports and continuous internal assessment report from subject teachers at the end of each semester which also helps in the analysis.

Response:

The College is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and it maps and ascertains its course outcomes (COs), program outcomes (POs), and program specific outcomes (PSOs) in a precise manner on the basis of following methods. The requirements of the Course(S)/Subjects, COs, POs, and PSOs are taken into consideration while using the customised evaluation patterns such as formative evaluation techniques which include student presentations, class assignments, tests, and quizzes, summative techniques like report writing and project report submission and written tests are also taken in the consideration. Regular teaching includes interactive classroom method, practical method, experiential teaching method, participative method and problem solving method, hands on training through demonstration, survey method. The varied evaluation techniques are practiced. The teachers also use online teaching materials and tools of online platforms like YouTube, social media and online courses like MOOCs and Career Katta and online evaluation method like quiz through google forms are practiced. Slow learners are identified on the basis of result of the first semester exam and they are provided with extra support in teaching through remedial teaching by Maths department to meet learning objectives. Teachers also encourage fast learners to achieve academic excellence by giving them opportunities of compeering in programs, participation in various elocution, debating, Avishkar poster presentation competitions etc. The mapping of the attainment of POs and PSOs also takes into account the following cross cutting issues: Environment and Sustainability, Human Values, Professional Ethics and Gender.

Consequently, the element of each course and subject is decided upon and recorded in order to map the achievement of COs, PSOs, and POs. Every Department submits result in pre-decided formats to Exam department for every Course to ensure that COs, PSOs, and POs are mapped to accomplishment. The COs are assessed using both direct and indirect methods. The direct technique involves internal and external theory and practical examinations marks in addition to continuous internal evaluation. Periodic internal tests, assignments, laboratory practical, seminars, and group discussions are all part of the continuous evaluation process (CIE). Teamwork skills, Communication skills, Leadership skills, Presentation skills, Time management skills, social responsibility etc personality development traits and continuing education are examples of indirect approaches utilised for obtaining specific PSO. The college map out the attainment of PSOs based on the results.

The results are evaluated by looking at student performance, such as the pass percentage, the proportion of students who graduate, and the number of students who drop out. The attainment levels are defined as follows.

Level 1 (40%-59%): indicates students who have successfully completed the respective course with the threshold value level of 1.

Level 2 (60%-69%): indicates students who have successfully completed the respective course with the threshold value level of 2.

Level 3 (70%-100%): indicates students who successfully completed the respective course with the threshold value level of 3.

In this way the technique of obtaining and mapping COs, POs, and PSOs is the grades/marks earned in a respective course as reported in the form of CGPA and SGPA for the Final Semester exams. The criteria for evaluating COs and PSOs' attainment have been created and approved by the exam department of the college.

Campus Overview:

The college, since its **inception in 1984**, has augmented its infrastructure continuously and has adequate physical infrastructural facilities. The campus features a **spacious three-storied building** that provides an ideal learning environment for our **1146 students.** The entire **campus has an area of 3.83 acres** and the total **built up area of 10103.91 Sq. Mtr.** The college campus is a verdant **oasis, home to over 2400 trees, as well as a diverse array of medicinal and herbal plants**, creating a lush and vibrant green environment that enhances the **campus's natural beauty**. The campus is protected by permanent wall compound and wire fencing. Progressive steps are taken to provide various infrastructure facilities like central library, staff-rooms, well-equipped research labs, conference halls, ladies room, reading rooms, Guest Room, Rainwater Harvesting Plant, Wet & Dry West Management, Vermicompost Unit, Water Purifier, college canteen, botanical garden, herbal garden, Plant Nursery, gymkhana, playgrounds, parking space, Water wells for Plant & other use, and student support services etc.

College infrastructure also includes **IQAC office, Controller of Examinations office, students counselling centre**, soft skill centre, boys' and girls' common rooms, health care centre, Guest room/day care centre, national service scheme office, national cadet core office, User friendly provisions are made for specially challenged students.

Our college boasts a robust and eco-friendly power supply system, combining traditional MSEB supply with renewable solar energy and **two Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) systems, each with a capacity of 7.5 KVA**, ensuring a reliable and continuous power supply to our critical systems and equipment. A rooftop solar plant generates **3 KW**, powering our laboratories and office, while **a solar photovoltaic systems of 15.36 KW on-grid system**, reduce our electricity bill and promote environmental sustainability.

Classrooms and Laboratories:

The college has **25 well-ventilated classrooms and some are ICT enabled**. The college boasts **12 spacious and well-equipped laboratories**, each dedicated to a specific department, including Science, B. Voc, ICT, Geography, English, and Commerce. These laboratories are furnished with advanced tools and instruments, facilitating seamless practical and research work. These labs are also provided with

interactive boards, computers and LCD projectors, overhead projectors. Chemistry and Physics department have separate research laboratories.

ICT facilities:

Our computer infrastructure comprises 122 computers, 5 laptops, 4 scanners, 47 laser printers, and 2 photocopy machines, ensuring that students have access to the latest technology. All departments in the college are provided with desktops, printers and scanners, some departments have LCD projectors, 86-inch movable 4K Interactive Panel with Ultra HD display. College has high-speed internet connectivity of 300 MBPS (more than 100 MBPS Distributive) bandwidth. The campus is wi-fi enabled and provides free internet connectivity to staff and students with secure login ID and password for using Wi-Fi facility. There are Five laboratories equipped with computing facilities. Entire college campus is under CCTV surveillance. The central library of the college provides 3 computers for INFLIBNET access to students.

Central Library:

The college has a spacious well-ventilated fully automated library with **1,852 Sq. Ft area**. It is Provided with IT Soft Developers Software for its use like BARCODE Scanner Books Issue, Returning and Students & Staffs Library Entry. The library boasts an impressive collection of **27,784** books, comprising reference books (**12,725**), text books (**15,059**), **15 audiobooks** for F.Y.B.A. and S.Y.B.A. classes, e-books (**1,95,809**<), e-journals & Periodicals (**6,793**<), digital data base and CD's and video (**180**). Central library has a reading room with desktop and internet connection is available for the students use. The library provides N-LIST and e-Shodh Sindhu (Free e-resource) for the academic and research purpose. The library has network resource facility, OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue), broadband connection and LAN facility.

Cultural Activities

Our musical instrument collection is a vibrant blend of **traditional and modern** elements, featuring a **Casio keyboard and harmonium** for melodic expression, a **tabla and dholki** for dynamic percussion, and a flute for soaring solos. To bring it all together, we also have a **public address system** to amplify and enhance our performances, allowing us to share our music with audiences of all sizes in auditorium hall.

Our college offers a comprehensive sports and recreation facility, featuring a table tennis table, a **10-meter Olympic-standard shooting lane with Swiss-made air pistol and rifle**, and a 6-station gym with weights and smith machine. Additionally, there's a dedicated weightlifting and powerlifting area, spinning bikes, and a gym bench. Students can also enjoy chess and carom tables, **while aspiring shooters can practice with dummy pistols**. This diverse range of equipment caters to various interests and promotes physical fitness, focus, and mental well-being among our students.

• Outdoor Activities

Our college boasts an impressive range of outdoor facilities, including a spacious **playground area spanning 8388 square feet**. The facilities cater to diverse sporting interests and feature dedicated courts for volleyball, basketball, and kabaddi, as well as a hockey practice goal post, cycling track, cricket training equipment, ball badminton court, and a **400-meter running track**.

Gymnasium

The College Library, established in 1984, has undergone significant transformations since its humble beginnings in a small room. Now housed in a spacious, separate building, the library spans 1,852 square feet and features various sections, including a Reading Room, Stack Room, Periodical Section, and Network Resource Center. The library boasts an impressive collection of 27,784 books, comprising 15,059 textbooks, 12,725 reference books, 15 audiobooks, 1,95,809 e-books, 6,793 e-journals & Periodicals, 180 digital data base and CD's and video. N-LIST for the academic and research purpose. The library has network resource facility, broadband connection and LAN facility.

The **collection covers a wide range** of subjects, including Languages and Literature, Social Sciences, Humanities, Commerce and Management, Pure and Applied Sciences, Sports, and Fine Arts.

The library is **fully automated through Integrated Library Management Systems (ILMS)** known as **IT Soft Developers** static **IP based version 2.6.0.5** It is a highly integrated, user-friendly and compatible system for complete computerization of all the in-house operations such as masters, book management, barcode facility, book accession, membership, circulation, **OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue)**, catalogues and administration. The IT Soft Developers is OPAC enabled through which users can search books and titles anytime and anywhere. IT Soft Developers is embedded with multilingual fonts, barcode & QR code fonts. The college library has **active subscription of INFLIBNET, N-List consortia** which provide huge data including e-journals, e-books to access the large pool of e-resources and tremendously vast collection of databases.

The library is equipped with **7 computers, a barcode printer, and a scanner with a printer**, with one computer designated for searching the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) and conveniently located on the counter for easy access by students and teachers.

Library advisory committee is in place to takes decision about purchase of new books as per allocation of funds and demand of the books by the departments through its HOD's and active for overall maintenance of existing books. Major decisions regarding the purchase & other issues like waiving of lapse books, weeding out of old titles, schedules of issue and return of books are taken in the library advisory committee. **Suggestion box** is installed inside the Library Premises to take user's feedback. Their **continuous feedback** helps a lot in introducing new ideas regarding library enrichment.

The college **library is enriched with** journals, reference books and text books, thesauruses, encyclopaedias, various dictionaries master pieces of the world, educational CD's and e- materials to suffice the thirst for knowledge of the students. There is a spacious **reading room for the teachers and the students**.

A good collection of **rare books** is available and have been preserved separately in the library.

The librarian regularly maintains library stock as well as rare books with the help of support staff. The stock register, the catalogue and the issue registers have been computerized. There is OPAC which helps to locate books in the library.

Per day usage of library:

A separate register for students and staff is maintained to keep the daily record of users of the library. Students regularly visit library for exchange of books, use of internet facility and library resources. Per day usage of library is quite good, on an average 46 students and staff members visit library every day.

Maintenance of hardware and ICT infrastructure is carried by a full-time employed IT consultant.

Annual maintenance of IT infrastructure is done by dealers provided through parent institution. All departments in the college are provided with Internet, desktops, laptops, printers, scanners, LCD projectors. Some departments are provided Interactive boards. New computers are added as per the needs. The college provides high speed internet connectivity of **300 MBPS** (more than **100 MBPS Distributive**) bandwidth for effective running of various software's and programmes. To support this infrastructure, we have installed Wi-Fi facilities across the campus using eight D-Link devices, covering the entire premises. Free internet connectivity is available to the stakeholders with secure login ID and passwords in entire campus. There are **05 computer laboratories** in the college at Department of Physics, Chemistry, Statistics, Commerce and IT etc.

The college has **05 laptops and 122 desktops** are available for students and teachers for academic and learning purpose. There are **14 LCD projectors**, **01 smart board**, **01 Interactive Panel with Ultra HD display**, **03 Epson all in one colour printer**, **04 scanners**, **47 printers**, **2 Digital cameras**, **04 web cameras and 2 photocopier machines** provided in office and support service centres for administrative, educational purpose.

The college has established a comprehensive technology infrastructure, featuring a high-speed BSNL Broadband line with LAN connection, providing seamless internet access to all departments, labs, and administrative offices. Regular upgrades ensure our computer facilities stay current with technological advancements, syllabi changes, and emerging technologies. We prioritize digital security with Quick Heal antivirus software, genuine Windows operating systems, and licensed copies, protecting our systems from malware and online threats. Additional software installations, including Tally Prime, Shree lip, SPSS, and ERP college administrator software, support students' academic pursuits. Hardware upgrades, such as SSDs, RAM, and laptops and Modems enhance operational efficiency, while active firewall protection and Wi-Fi facilities extend to various departments. With more than 100 mbps internet bandwidth speed, our students and staff can explore, learn, and innovate in a technology-rich environment, supported by robust digital security measures, authentic software, and regular upgrades.

The college has invested in technology to enhance its operations and facilitate online collaboration. It has purchased **'E-campus' software**, a comprehensive solution for campus management, student information, and administrative work. Additionally, the college has a subscription to **'Google Meet (G-suite)' software**, which enables it to conduct online meetings, seminars, webinars, and conferences with ease. These tools streamline administrative tasks and facilitate seamless communication and collaboration among students, faculty, and staff.

Our institution, under the umbrella of Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj Sanstha, utilizes the **IT Soft HRMS (e-Campus) software** to streamline and manage various administrative tasks. This software automates and oversees office operations, admission processes, salary disbursements, and exams, while the **Auto Lib** Software manages the library. Additionally, financial accounts are maintained and managed through **Tally Prime** Software. To ensure efficiency and security, the college regularly purchases and updates essential office automation packages, including MS Office, Tally, and antivirus software.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

The college has a well-defined organizational hierarchical structure in accordance with parent institution, Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj, Nashik, through IQAC and College Development Committee (CDC) which makes participatory administration easier in two aspects viz; administrative organization structure and academic administrative structure. Ultimately, the functioning of HEI is governed by parent institute. College has given a well-prepared organogram. The Governing Body as per the Constitution of the college has 16 members in all. It is headed by the principal of the college, is the Chairperson of the governing body, one prominent person from the parent institution as a member, while there are eight nominees from the staff of the college, one local society member, one alumni member, one industrial sector member, one nonteaching member and one student representative member, Chairman of Local Management Committee as special invitee. The principal forms the nucleus of the administration as the final authority in all financial matters. The Vice-principal & Head of the Department, as the monitor of all academic affairs. The Academic Committee consisted of the IQAC coordinator and heads of the departments are directly under the principal relating to the academic development of the college. The academic and administrative plans such as framing policies, benchmarks, and organization of activities, inputs for quality audits, AQARs and NAAC accreditation, prepared by IQAC considering the involvement of all stakeholders are discussed and approved in CDC meetings and accordingly plans are executed.

Different committees are established by college to ensure the smooth operation and execution of various activities. The committees like IQAC Cell, Examination, Admission, Purchase, Library, Campus Development, Discipline, Academic Research and Development, Anti-ragging and Anti Sexual

Harassment, Women Cell, etc. are in place to oversee the proper and effective organization of the college, and are led by teachers. To achieve continuous growth there is a well-defined quality policy which are needed in various areas such as curriculum development, teaching-learning, examination, admission, research, consultancy etc. The publication cell of college publishes Annual Magazine '*Pushpak*' which takes into account all the administrative and academic activities of all stakeholders.

The parent institute is in charge of recruiting for all positions, and HEI oversees the services in accordance with the policies and guidelines of the affiliated university, the Maharashtra Government, and the Indian Government which are based on UGC's recommendations. The institution has well-established policies and processes that are routinely followed in order to foster an effective work culture. Promotions to the faculty and staff are granted based on CRs, APIs, and other factors in accordance with the CAS regulations of the University and the Maharashtra Government. IQAC organizes an orientation workshop or motivate teachers to participate and inform teachers about the API regulations that are periodically issued. The IQAC calculate and verify the API scores of the faculties for promotion.

In order to guarantee efficacy and transparency, the grievance redressal cell assists with the prompt and timely resolution of grievances.

The IQAC has prepared a perspective plan for the period of five years commencing from academic year 2019-20 to academic year 2023-24 by taking into consideration the quality indicators of seven criterions determined by NAAC, recommendations of previous accreditations, and SWOC analysis.

Constructive feedback is provided to faculty members during academic meetings with the principal and department heads, highlighting areas for improvement.
- 4. **Student Feedback:** Faculty performance is also assessed based on student feedback. This feedback is integrated into the evaluation process, with recommendations for improvement shared

with faculty members.

5. **Non-Teaching Staff Appraisal:** Non-teaching staff performance is evaluated through confidential reports assessed by the registrar and heads of departments before final evaluation by the principal.

Welfare Measures:

1. Welfare Schemes for Staff:

- **Medical and Financial Benefits:** Teaching and non-teaching staff, especially those under self-finance schemes, receive medical insurance, gratuity, provident fund, and earned leave. - **On-Campus Facilities:** Free internet/wifi, an email address with the institution's domain, and a tea club are available. Indoor game facilities for staff and well-secured parking area is also provided.

3. Recognition and Support:

- **Felicitation:** Staff members are recognized with certificates or letters of appreciation for exceptional work in research and consultancy.
- **Retirement Honors:** Retiring staff are honored by the institution.

4. Financial Support:

Insurance and Loans: Members of the MVP Sevak Society and College Teacher Society benefit from accidental insurance policies of up to Rs. 25 lakhs. Co-operative societies offer loans up to Rs. 50 lakhs, with emergency loans up to Rs. 75,000 and festival loans up to Rs. 10,000. There are also provisions for loans against medical expenses and accident-related insurance. Loans taken would be forgiven in case of Member's death.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Arts, Science, and Commerce College (ASC), Ozar (Mig), Tal. Niphad has established a comprehensive Resource Mobilization Policy aimed at ensuring efficient management and optimal utilization of financial resources. This policy is crucial for maintaining organizational sustainability and supporting the college's development goals.

Budget Preparation and Approval Process: Each academic year, the budgetary needs of the college are meticulously planned. Heads of Departments draft individual departmental budgets after consultations with their respective teams. These budgets reflect the developmental and maintenance goals specific to each department. Once prepared, these departmental budgets are submitted to the purchase committee. Purchase Committee works on the details of the budgetary plans and presents it to the Principal and CDC.

The Principal, along with the Accounts Officer, consolidates these departmental budgets into an institutional proposed budget. This consolidated budget is then discussed with the College Development Committee and the Principal. After necessary revisions, it is forwarded to the MVPs Central Office in Nashik for final approval and allocation.

Revenue Generation and Utilization: The budgetary sources of the college include plan and non-plan grants received from Government of Maharashtra. Different grants such as grant for Earn & Learn Scheme, N.S.S., Student Welfare Fund, and Examination grant etc. are received from Savitribai Phule

Pune University, Pune. EBC and BC scholarship grants are received from Government of Maharashtra. The primary source of revenue for ASC College is tuition fees. The funds generated are allocated to various critical areas including staff salaries, acquisition of equipment and instruments, repair and maintenance of facilities, library resources (books, journals, and e-books), e-governance initiatives, and overall development and maintenance of the college. For purchase of more than Rs. 40,000/- quotations are invited. The lowest quotation assuring good quality is selected. The parent organization identifies and updates different vendors for purchase. For any purchase above Rs. 2000/, prior permission of the parent institution is taken.

Audit Procedures: As part of the Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj (MVPs), ASC College adheres to stringent internal and external audit requirements. The audit process is conducted annually, as coordinated by the MVP Central Office in Nashik.

MVP's Central Office appoints a statutory auditor and coordinates the audit schedule. The audit firm is notified and the audit dates are confirmed, with details communicated to the college.

The college ensures that all necessary documents, including payment tax records, cash receipts, vouchers, challans, scholarship records, salary details, and compliance reports, are readily available. Computerized financial records, such as cash books and ledgers, are updated and accessible. Library records, purchase registers, and stock inventories are also prepared for verification. The audit team reviews all provided documents and financial records. They verify deposits, fees collected, and other financial transactions. The auditor provides an overview of findings and suggestions.

Any unresolved queries are coordinated with the MVP Central Office for resolution. A final balance sheet is prepared by the Chief Accounts and Finance Officer in collaboration with the external audit agency. The audit report is finalized and signed by the Chartered Accountants.

Response:

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college has been established in accordance with the guidelines of the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) and the University Grants Commission (UGC). It plays a crucial role in enhancing the quality of education and institutional performance. The IQAC meets two to three times a year to plan and review activities aimed at improving various aspects of the college's functioning.

One of the primary functions of the IQAC is to document various activities and programs of the college, which are essential for preparing reports needed for rankings, assessments, accreditations, and other submissions. It conducts an annual Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) through the parent institution, ensuring a culture of quality in teaching, learning, and evaluation. Additionally, the IQAC encourages faculty members to participate in curriculum design and develop new programs and certificate courses. Feedback mechanisms are also overseen by the IQAC, where input from stakeholders such as students, faculty, and others is used to guide policy decisions related to quality improvement.

The IQAC plays a significant role in organizing workshops, seminars, and conferences focused on quality enhancement, fostering a culture of quality within the institution. It motivates faculty members to adopt innovative teaching and learning methods. Based on the IQAC's recommendations, the college provides seed money to faculty members for research projects. Over the past five years, the college has organized 24 seminars, conferences, workshops, and webinars, and established 25 Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) with various institutions and organizations, which have further strengthened its academic and research activities.

The IQAC is dedicated to improving the quality of education and infrastructure at the college. It identifies new methods for incorporating Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in teaching, and it proposes the development of suitable infrastructure and new courses. The IQAC also forms various academic, administrative, curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular committees at the start of each academic year. The decisions made by the IQAC are presented to the College Development Committee (CDC) for approval and implementation.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the IQAC played a pivotal role in ensuring the continuation of teaching, learning, and evaluation processes. It coordinated the transition to online teaching and organized training for faculty members to familiarize them with digital platforms for online classes. Faculty members were encouraged to take up Faculty Development Programs (FDPs), workshops, and webinars to improve their understanding of online education. The IQAC monitored the teaching and learning process through online platforms and ensured that all faculty members sent links to online lectures to the principal for supervision. It also made efforts to maintain student engagement and mental well-being during the pandemic through online classes, social media groups, and phone calls.

At the beginning of every academic year, the IQAC, along with the principal and committee members, prepares academic and administrative plans, which are implemented throughout the year. Progress reports are collected, analyzed, and maintained by the IQAC at the end of each semester to ensure continuous improvement in the teaching-learning process. Overall, the IQAC serves as a central body that coordinates, monitors, and facilitates various institutional processes to assure quality in education and administration.

In 2022 and 2023, we were honored with the Green and Clean College Campus State Level Award from Dnyanjyyoti Bahuddeshiya Sanstha Ahmednagar, recognizing our efforts in creating a sustainable environment. Additionally, the Government of Maharashtra awarded us the Chatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vanshree State Level Award in 2014, valued at one lakh rupees, for our exemplary practices. Our campus spans 18,200 square meters, with 10,250 square meters (56.30%) covered in greenery, reflecting our dedication to environmental conservation.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Initial Costs of Green Practices: Implementing green initiatives, like installing solar panels and establishing vermiculture, required significant investment—approximately ?987,000. For instance, the sandy campus soil necessitated purchasing nutrient-rich soil for successful planting.

Maintenance of Green Infrastructure: Ongoing maintenance of solar systems, vermicomposting units, and greenery demands continuous labor and financial resources, including regular fertilizer and watering.

Behavioral Awareness: Promoting eco-friendly habits among stakeholders, such as reducing plastic use and proper waste sorting, requires persistent education and commitment, which can be challenging.

Handling and Disposal: While the college effectively reduces waste, coordinating with vendors for recycling paper and processing used printer cartridges involves logistical complexities.

Limited Space: The college faces challenges in finding new areas for planting or setting up systems due to limited space. To address this, plans for developing a vertical garden are underway to balance campus development with greenery.

Resources Required

To maintain and expand the green campus, several resources are essential:

Financial Resources: Funding is needed for upgrading solar energy systems, maintaining vermiculture units, and acquiring eco-friendly materials.

Human Resources: Technical staff for solar system maintenance, caretakers for planting, and workers for waste management are crucial.

Partnerships: Collaborations with vendors for recycling paper waste and managing used printer cartridges are vital for effective waste management.

Technological Support: Access to advanced technologies is necessary to enhance the effectiveness of green initiatives, including solar power and recycling methods.

Response:

Environment Friendly Approach:

MVP's Arts, Science, and Commerce College, located in Ozar (Mig), is a distinguished educational institution, uniquely positioned within a spreading 3.83 acres of green land. The institution is a centre of ecological and intellectual vitality because it represents a harmonic union of academic achievement with environmental conscience. The institution's commitment to creating an environmentally sustainable and culturally rich campus sets it apart from others in the region.

Diverse Flora and Fauna

One of the key features that highlight the distinctiveness of the college is its biodiversity rich campus. The college campus is home to 108 plant species, representing 44 families of angiosperms and three gymnosperms. This botanical diversity not only enhances the aesthetic appeal of the college but also provides a living laboratory for students. The campus's diverse flora and fauna includes species with a wide range of ecological and medicinal significance, offering practical learning opportunities.

Flora Highlights:

The campus showed 108 plants species were growing in the college campus belonging to 44 families of angiosperms and 3 Gymnosperms. The total 11 edibles fruit plants, 30 medicinal, 64 ornamental and 3 timber yielding plants are in campus. The plant species list includes well-known varieties such as *Mangifera indica* (commonly known as mango), and *Catharanthus roseus* (periwinkle), which is significant for its ornamental and medicinal properties. Other notable species include *Ficus religiosa* (peepal tree), renowned for its religious and medicinal importance, and *Tectona grandis* (teak), a valuable timber-yielding plant. Additionally, the college campus has state flower of Maharashtra, *Lagerstroemia speciosa*.

The diversity is not limited to trees but extends to shrubs, herbs, and climbers, all of which contribute to the rich habitat that supports a variety of faunal diversity. This ecological balance offers students a handson experience in environmental management, conservation practices, and biodiversity studies, making the college campus a natural classroom. We have also extended our effort beyond the campus by tree plantation initiative through NSS activities at the adopted village.

Butterfly Species: Signs of a Stable Ecosystem

Butterflies, often considered indicators of a healthy environment, are abundant on the college campus. The presence of different butterfly species, such as the Great Eggfly, Common Grass Yellow, and Common Rose, points to the thriving ecosystem within the campus. These species not only add to the beauty of the campus but also play a crucial role in pollination.

This diversity in butterflies enhances the environmental education experience for students, offering them an opportunity to study ecological interactions, pollination biology, and species conservation in realtime.

Avian Diversity

The college is also a home for various bird species, which further enhances its ecological distinctiveness. Birds such as the Common Tailorbird, Indian Paradise Flycatcher, Asian Koel, and Purple-rumped Sunbird are frequently sighted on the campus. The presence of these birds not only adds to the campus's biodiversity but also provides students with opportunities for ornithological studies. The college actively celebrates World Sparrow Day, recognizing the importance of conserving this important bird species. The college also organizes informative lectures focused on snakes and their role in nature.

Solar Ambassador Initiative

In line with its commitment to environmental conservation, our college has implemented the **''Solar Ambassador''** initiative, a notable best practice aimed at promoting sustainable energy use. The initiative focuses on spreading awareness about energy conservation and the benefits of using renewable energy sources.

By promoting renewable energy, the college is actively contributing to empowerment of rural communities to become self-reliant in their energy needs. The college has installed 15.6 KW and 3.5 KW solar energy system, which not only powers the campus but also ensures that the college receives a zero-electricity bill from MSEB (Maharashtra State Electricity Board). We are also using energy efficient devices in the college. This initiative reflects the college's dedication to conserving energy, reducing carbon footprints, and saving financial resources.

Community Engagement and Social Responsibility

Through various outreach programs, the college actively engages with the local community, particularly in rural areas. Encouraging and teaching rural farmers to adopt solar-powered agricultural equipment, the Solar Ambassador program seeks to lower their energy expenses and reduce their environmental effect. Additionally, the college organizes workshops and seminars on topics such as renewable energy, sustainable agriculture, and conservation practices.

The college is deeply committed to environmental sustainability and community welfare through a range of impactful initiatives. Among the significant efforts is the **River Cleaning Programme**, which focuses on cleaning and conserving rivers, making them pollution-free and ensuring they remain a vital resource for the surrounding ecosystem.

The college regularly organizes cleaning drives within the campus. The cleaning efforts extend beyond the campus, with the National Service Scheme (NSS) leading various programmes in nearby villages, including Sonewadi, Chandori, and Sukene. The college also promotes pesticide-free farming practices in these villages, encouraging sustainable agricultural methods that reduce environmental harm and support healthier ecosystems.

The college has taken significant steps towards sustainability through the establishment of a vermicompost unit. This unit serves as a valuable source of bio-fertilizer, providing an eco-friendly alternative to chemical fertilizers.

The college takes effort to keep the campus free from plastic. Efforts are taken to dispose the e-waste according to the guidelines of pollution control board.

Furthermore, the college has implemented a water harvesting system, which plays a crucial role in conserving water. This system collects and stores rainwater, which is then reused, reducing the college's dependence on external water sources and promoting efficient water management.

Through these multifaceted efforts, the college demonstrates a strong commitment to environmental conservation, and community welfare, making a positive impact both on campus and in the surrounding areas.
